After 2 years the UK's longest-running, internationally recognised arboriculture conference is back with a new venue and one of the most exciting programmes of speakers in its history. This year delegates will be able to enjoy a more varied format with each day split between lectures and workshops.

The title of the 2022 Amenity Conference is **What is a tree?** and it will be exploring this fundamental question through a wide range of activity. As well as presentations in the main lecture theatre and workshops led by internationally-renowned experts, we will celebrate our return to an in-persor conference with plenty of social events and networking opportunities.

Within its exploration and discussion of the question 'What is a tree?' the conference will consider the concept of tree ecology, with the tree both as part of a wider ecosystem and as an ecosystem in its own right. For too long, urban and amenity trees were often viewed as existing in isolation - each an individual tree, perceived and managed as an individual unit. Over time we have come to appreciate that this is not the case. Trees are not only key elements of wider ecosystems, but can constitute ecosystems in their own right. Once, when asked the question 'What is a tree?' we mig have replied with a dictionary definition - a tall plant with a wooden trunk and branche or a woody perennial plant with an elongation main stem. We might have quoted Justice Cranston and responded that a tree is anything that would ordinarily be regarded as a tree. A tree is an assemblage of cells, arranged as roots, stem, fruit. We know that it can be far more complicated than this,

and that a simple answer is not easily given. We must consider tree ecology. What impact does our increasing understanding of how trees function have on our understanding of what a tree actually is? To what extent must fungi be considered part of a tree when we cannot always tell where the roots end and the

mycorrhizas begin? What about the soil and the microbes? The endophytes and epiphytes? What about all of the flora, fauna and funga which coexist with trees?
